Sharing the grace of God with one another and the world around us.





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ABOUT Magnificat, Wq. 215

Carl Philipp Emanuel Bach, the eldest son of Johann Sebastian, wrote his brilliant *Magnificat* in 1749. At the time, he was employed in Prussia at the court of Frederick the Great, where his principal occupation was as a composer and keyboard player. He adapted his work over his career, and the movements used this morning include horns and trumpets from the final edition. Many say that the *Sicut Erat* (final movement) resembles Mozart's famous *Kyrie* from his *Requiem* which was written 40 years after C.P.E. Bach's.

THE CHRISMON TREE

In 1986 a former member of our church, Edith Breed, President of the Women of the Church, had a dream of one day having a Chrismon Tree during the Advent Season in our church. Many women in the church researched the symbols of Christianity and handmade all of the decorations that you see on the tree in the Sanctuary. White is the liturgical color of Christmas which refers to the purity and perfection of Christ, and gold to the majesty and glory of Christ. The first Chrismon Tree was put in the Narthex for all to see in 1989. Please enjoy this piece of our history, which represents the work of so many women of our church.

JESUS CHRIST: BIRTH



From its Roman Catholic origins, this 18th-century hymn has spread to worldwide use by many denominations in both Latin and vernacular versions. Once popular with a wide range of hymn texts, this tune is now firmly associated with this Christmas text from which it is named.



While Isaac Watts did not write this text strictly for Christmas use, he did purposely cast his paraphrase of Psalm 98:4–9 in Christian terms, titling it "The Messiah's coming and kingdom." So "the Lord" here is Jesus Christ, rather than the God of Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob.
