March 7: Being the Body of Christ During Times of Crisis

reflections

"When Jesus saw the sick man lying there and knew that he had been there a long time, he said to him, 'Do you want to be made well?" (John 5:6)

Dear Friends.

A number of years ago a friend introduced me to Louise Penny, author of a series of murder mysteries set in the Canadian province of Quebec. Her main character is Chief Inspector Armand Gamache who is himself a mystery, a multi-layered, complex individual. Since then I have read every one of Penny's novels, finding in them not just quality entertainment, but wisdom for living.

In one of the books Gamache is in conversation with a colleague about the ingredients of a life of integrity. Penny puts on his lips a kind of creed I have shared previously with this congregation expression of that grace through those in sermon and conversation: a life of integrity involves being able to say, and to live out, "I'm sorry, I was wrong, I don't know, I need help." That statement, along with other clues scattered throughout her work, made me wonder if Ms. Penny is intimately familiar with twelve-step programs, perhaps in recovery herself. An interview I watched online confirmed that suspicion and made me respect her even more.

Though I am not addicted to alcohol or other drugs and do not come from parents with that disease, many of you are aware that the twelve-step approach to life and recovery, the twelve-step spirituality, if you will, has been powerfully

influential in shaping my understanding of the Christian life. I'm not sure why that is, but something about it rings wise

Gamache's "I need help" touches me personally. Many of us who are highachieving, responsible types live with the illness-inducing illusion that we can, even must, make it on our own, solve our own problems, fix those around us, and transform the world through force of will and competence. It seems silly reading such audacity and it might be amusing if it weren't so dangerous and destructive. The genius of AA, and even more the gospel of Jesus Christ, is that to be whole we must recognize and accept that the power of evil and our internal darkness is too big for us, too strong for us, to handle on our own. Only the grace of God in Jesus Christ, and the around us, can set us free from our compulsions and make us well.

Jesus asks the sick man if he wants to be made well. I believe he asks you and me the same question. Lent is traditionally a time to give up something we value as an act of discipline and commitment. But Lent is also a time to take on a discipline. For me, this Lent, I'm focusing on saying to my brothers and sisters in faith and to the God who calls and loves me, in various ways, "I need help." How about you?

- Approved a motion to change the date from Sunday, April 1, 2018, to Sunday, April 8, 2018, for the service of Holy Communion at the 8:30a and the 10:50a worship services;
- Approved a motion to elect Todd Smith as a member of the Personnel Committee;
- Received a review from the Personnel Committee regarding compensation for staff members;
- Received an update from the Mission Committee regarding the refugee project;
- Approved a motion to receive the One Great Hour of Sharing Offering during worship services on Sunday, April 1, 2018; and
- Received a report regarding the Mid-Kentucky Presbytery meeting of February 10, 2018.


