reflections

"Then Jesus called the twelve together and gave them power and authority over all demons and to cure diseases, and he sent them out to proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal." (Luke 9:1-2)

Dear Friends,

Many years ago I attended a workshop led by a Presbyterian minister whose workshop and accompanying book presented a core conviction that has stuck with me ever since. He argued that for churches like ours, the prevailing model for what the church is to be about is what he called "the participatory model." Our main task, in that model, is to get people to come to the church campus seven days a week, ideally, where the needs of as many people as possible will be addressed by their participation in a variety of programs and activities.

This pastor holds out an alternative vision of the main purpose, or mission, of the church. "The mission of the church is what members do during the week...The primary mission of a congregation is the building of the kingdom of God on earth through the activities we do in the world through the week." The primary task of the church, mainly through its worship life, is to shape, train, and equip its people to follow and witness to Jesus in their daily lives, using the gifts of the Holy Spirit they've been given. As in the text from Luke above, as followers of Jesus we gather around word, table, and font on a regular basis to be transformed into those who witness to Jesus Christ in our ordinary, routine lives, in the contexts in which we spend most of our time.

That perspective has captured my

imagination and challenged me in how I understand my ministry. This model doesn't mean that education ministries and fellowship opportunities and a strong youth program and mission support aren't important. It means, simply, that we give priority to the training and equipping of disciples so that you can know your gifts and use them faithfully in the life you live away from Second.

That is the genesis of Crossroads: Where Faith and Life Intersect. Crossroads is a ministry of this church, funded by a donor's generous gift, to provide opportunities for our members, as well as the wider community, to go deeper in living out and applying their faith to the practical issues of life. Through workshops, seminars, conferences, support groups and classes, Crossroads seeks to help disciples discern their gifts and use them in the real world through strengthening and deepening basic tools of faith such as prayer, study of Scripture, and service to others. Crossroads is meant to be in partnership with our current Christian formation ministries.

Dianne Reistroffer ably and gracefully led the inaugural year of Crossroads, helping us fine tune its vision. Elsewhere in the newsletter, you will meet the new Director of Crossroads, Maxine Thomas. I pray you will seek her out and make her welcome in this ministry. More information about Crossroads as well as opportunities to be a part of this ministry will be coming soon. It is you, not somebody else, whom God is calling to "proclaim the kingdom of God and to heal" in your daily life in the world God loves.

She also coordinates women clergy cross cultural training and empowerment seminars, and a variety of other training and healing experiences for women. She is the founder of My Sister's Keeper Bible and Leadership Academy, which provides biblical studies and leadership training for women. The first graduation was in December 2016.

Biblical Studies

The Biblical Studies class deals with historical critical scholarship related to the Bible and is of particular interest to Christians who want to understand the Bible more thoroughly in terms of its long history. No prior biblical knowledge is necessary, simply a curiosity for historical details related to the Bible and its Christian origins. The class is led by Acton Ostling, retired Professor of Music at the University of Louisville, and it meets in Room 252, adjacent to the church parlor.



Occasional Class Offerings

From time to time, classes related to a special season on the Christian calendar, or when a special guest instructor is available, are offered. These classes will be publicized in advance, with a full description of the offering and its leadership.

Living Our Faith

This class is for Christians who wish to explore the connection between faith and life in everyday living and who seek spiritual answers to personal dilemmas. Drawing on biblical and theological foundations as well as from other disciplines, topics for discussion include vocational identity, workplace ethics, family life and finding a sense of belonging in today's world. The class meets in Fellowship Hall B with facilitator/ teacher Rev. Dr. Dianne Reistroffer. Class coordinator is Monique Tilford.

2nd Sunday

The 2nd Sunday class is for parents of children from birth through early teens. While titled "Second" Sunday, the class meets on both the second and fourth Sundays of each month. Curriculum deals with issues facing young parents trying to raise faithful children in this tumultuous and ever-changing world. Class members share experiences and ideas, with the goal of helping each other find ways to make God the center of our families. The class meets in Room 251 with facilitators Lee and Vic Baltzell.

Christianity Today

What does it mean to say that you are a Christian? This is the overarching theme of the class, to discover together what it means to be a Christ follower in today's world and context. Some of the questions we ponder together: "What is the Bible? How did we get it and how do we use it? Who is Jesus and why does he matter? Why did he die on the cross and what's the deal with sin? How do I know what happens when I die? Why does suffering exist?" The class is led by Pastors Nathan Sautter and Steve Jester and meets in Room 107.

Pathways

Members of the Pathways Class are united in their pursuit of knowledge of biblical, historical and social issues, and all other facets that lead to a balanced Christian life. The class is also a community that has a yearly seminar, a Derby party, and a Christmas get-together along with other social events. As one example, class members make sandwiches for the Wayside Christian Mission. The class meets in Fellowship Hall A with moderator Elizabeth Clay.

Reading The Bible

The Reading The Bible class doesn't require knowledge of Greek or Hebrew. But understanding what a biblical phrase or verse means in today's language calls for knowledge of the historical setting and what it meant when it was written in another language, with concern for its theological meaning today. The class is led by Dr. Marty Soards, Professor of New Testament Studies at Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary, and the class meets in the Chapel. Jim Haynes is class coordinator.

Bible Studies

Morning Joy

Spring and Fall sessions of this weekly Bible study on Thursday mornings concentrate on a specific book of the Bible. Classes meet in Fellowship Hall and are led by Senior Pastor

On days other than Sundays

Steve Jester, with the women and men who attend – both church members and guests -- providing lots of discussion and questions. Classes begin at 9:30 a.m. with coffee and the sharing of church joys and concerns. At the conclusion of each class by 11 a.m., small discussion groups convene for those who choose to participate. A syllabus of the class study will be provided in advance of Morning Joy sessions, so that attendees can familiarize themselves with what book of the Bible to concentrate on in preparation.

Men's Weekday Bible Study

The John Rodman Men's Bible Study class meets for one hour each Friday, at 7 a.m., for fellowship, prayer, and study of a Bible passage. The group focuses on the meaning of each weekly passage and related commentaries, and how they relate to their personal lives. Study topics are announced in advance so that attendees can prepare themselves for the discussion. The Rev. Dr. John M. Mulder leads the class, which meets in Room 251, next to the Library.

Transit

The Transit young adult ministry is for those in transition. Many participants are in their 20s or early 30s and are in flux between school, entering the workforce, climbing the career ladder and everything in between. It is for young adults who are veterans of Louisville as well as those who are new to the area and are trying to find a community and group to connect with. Transit meets every other Thursday during the school year at 7 p.m. for dinner and conversation about faith and life. There also are various social gatherings through the year. What We've Been Up To

I hope your summer has been a season of rest, relaxation, and recreation! For this edition of Kilgore Korner I wanted to pause for a moment from our series on family resilience and give you a glimpse into the many different ways Kilgore is meeting a broad range of needs in our community.

You are likely aware that we provide outpatient counseling to all ages dealing with all sorts of challenges from more individually-situated problems such as depression and anxiety, to relationally-situated problems such as marital conflict, parenting, and many others. But you may not be aware of our partnerships offsite that have given us the opportunity to broaden the scope and reach of our services. One our clinicians, Jim McGee, initiated a partnership with the Louisville Nature Center to offer a series of therapeutic music groups as part of

their summer programming. Jim is gifted musician and does a great job of integrating music into the therapeutic process. This past school year he provided a similar service to students at The West End School.

Debbie Edds, our clinical psychologist, also serves The West End School through psychological testing, consulting, and staff training. Additionally, since September of 2017, two of our clinicians, Michelle Holbrook and Tommy Terwilliger, have been facilitating group and individual therapy for women at The Healing Place, a residential facility for those recovering from substance use. We are hopeful about expanding these services to the men's program at The Healing Place. Lastly, in partnership with Eastern Area Community Ministries, Tommy facilitates a monthly wellness workshop for their program participants.
