Dear Friends,

It was mid-afternoon on an average day recently at the church. The volunteer at the front desk buzzed me to let me know that I had a visitor and gave me the name. It was a young woman who had once been an active part of this community of faith but had moved away years ago. I went down the hallway to greet her and her husband and gladly invited them to join me in my study for conversation.

My visitor wasn't someone I knew well, but our paths had crossed because of a tragic and painful event in her family's life. When this tragedy struck I went to the family's



home and visited with them in one of those moments of shock and disbelief. I don't remember any specifics of what I said to them and remember trying to put into practice my conviction that the best thing to do in such dark times is not to explain or provide easy answers but to simply be present.

But during our recent conversation it became clear that she remembered something that had been said and that it had given her great comfort. She thanked me for that visit and for follow-up contact with her family. After a little bit of small talk she and her husband left to get on with their lives and I with mine.

A theologian whose work I read this past week as part of continuing education time speaks of the centrality of a notion of "the good life" in determining how we live. What (or who) is it we believe gives our lives meaning and purpose, depth and richness? What are our values, our convictions, our goals? This author writes that his vision of the good life is a life of getting out of ourselves, beyond ourselves, and joining with others in caring, serving relationships. The good life, for him, is living with "a passion for the other," perfectly exemplified in Jesus Christ.

As I read his musings, I thought of the encounter with that young woman. By the grace of God we had connected on a deep level and I had conveyed to her the hope of the gospel. She ministered to me with gratitude and by reminding me how God uses our feeble efforts in powerful and unexpected ways. It was a "God moment," an illustration of what "the good life" is about.

As we head into the season of Advent at the end of November, this season of waiting and watching for the appearing of our Lord and Savior, I encourage you to be mindful of the ways the Spirit lifts you out of yourself to reach out to others in care and concern and how you are the recipient of such ministering from others. Welcome to the good life!

Youth

One of our 2PY youth reflects on their time at Montreat last year:

Through reflecting [on our week at Montreat], I realized the vast amount that God intertwined himself through this week, much more than I had even thought would be possible going in. This was my second year at Montreat and, to be completely honest, my first year was very difficult for me. I came in very unsure of myself, constantly worrying about how I was presenting myself and the thoughts of others around me, and it kept me from making the most out of the experience. But over this past year, I have grown so much as a person, becoming more true and confident within myself and, as I started going back to school after the pandemic, I saw slight evidence of this. I began making new connections and asserting myself more, but Montreat was something much bigger than this. Every day at Montreat solidified this change in myself and furthered it. I fostered so many new connections this week both with new people in my small group and those that I had already known from Second Presbyterian, but had yet to speak much with. The conversations I had this week with those I had not yet truly gotten to know meant more to me than they could know and I'm so grateful to have gotten the opportunity to have them...

This photograph is of a student who happened to meet his teacher from last year in the atrium one morning. He had come in a bit upset from his transition away from mom. When he saw his former teacher, Cathy, she bent down to speak with him at his eve level. She focused all of her attention on him and spoke in soft, kind words. Her actions communicated respect, trust and presence to him. He responded by becoming very still. His breathing slowed, and he stared into her eyes, listening to every word she said. The few people nearby all paused their own movement and watched this tender moment. The connection between Cathy and the child was palpable and demonstrated how a strong relationship endures, even when a student moves into a new classroom. We work for children to feel respected, important and loved at 2nd Pres, and this was a beautiful example of it in action.

Our newest partner in mission is South Louisville Community Ministries, located at 415-1/2 W Ashland Ave, adjacent to Beechmont Presbyterian Church. SLCM serves 40214, a zip code with the highest rates of eviction in the city: the eviction moratorium may be the one thing that has allowed families there to survive the pandemic. Without a home, families cannot quarantine and protect themselves from the risk of exposure to Covid. SLCM witnesses this firsthand and, in response, runs a Rent Assistance Clinic on Thursdays., where they have helped close to 100 people per week since August.

You can help support this mission by donating food and household products. Grocery bags for items will be in the Narthex on Sunday, Oct. 31. Other donations left in the Mission Room need to be marked with SLCM. Requested items are:

For all who are led by the Spirit of God are children of God. For you did not receive a spirit of slavery to fall back in fear, but you have received a spirit of adoption. Romans 8:14-15 (NRSV)

Kentucky Refugee Ministry (KRM), like most resettlement ministries, has been deeply impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Travel restrictions, quarantines, reduced staffing, and funding are in part responsible for the sharp decline in U.S. resettlements over the past two years. The steps towards resettlement have slowed dramatically. Many refugees are now stuck at resettlement processing centers, unable to move to more permanent, safe homes.

Raees Amiri's brother was evacuated from Afghanistan in August with his wife and their three children. They passed through Germany and Virginia. For the past month they have been on a base in Texas completing medical and other clearances. If all goes well, Church World Services will be able to settle them in Louisville through KRM. The hope is that this family will be reunited in the very near future.

Update on sponsored families:

The Amiris discovered Green River and KOA campgrounds during fall week-end trips. School goes well for Bibi and Anosha at Ferncreek Elementary. KRM has created an opportunity for Khatul to provide home-cooked Afghan meals for new arrivals to Louisville.

Nedal received a raise at UPS and continues work online for another degree. He and his sister, Rawan, are doing fine. Like the Amiris, Nedal has offered his help for new refugees.

The grace shared at Second comes full circle as our sponsored families help those just arriving. A big thanks to our members and friends who have donated so generously. The 2021 Thank Offering recipients included the Nature Preschool at Holston Presbytery Camp & Retreat Center in Banner Elk, N.C. and a Women's Hostel at Chasefu Theological College in Chasefu, Zambia, housing women learning essential farming skills, and expanding women in ministry. Checks can be made payable to PW Mid-KY, for the Thank Offering, and mailed to PW Mid-KY Treasurer JoAnna Overstreet, 4102 Spring Park Lane, Louisville, KY 40218. \$996 was collected at our Annual Prayer Service in September and given to Kentucky Refugee Ministries.

The 2021-22 Horizons Bible study "What My Grandmothers Taught Me" by Merryl Blair explores the women in the lineage of Jesus.

Lesson 2 is the story of Judah and Tamar found in Genesis 38. Tamar shows us how God used this marginalized, powerless woman to fulfill a role in His

magnificent story. Following the practice of leverite (brother-in-law) marriage, Tamar is twice widowed by sons of Judah. Fearing for his third son, Judah sends Tamar home to her father. Following the death of Judah's wife, Tamar uses her only assets, her femininity and her wiles, to engage with Judah, with whom she will bear twin sons, Perez and Zerah. This ordinary woman "with all her faults and failings' illustrates how God can use "people like us" and can transform our expectations.

Lesson 3 tells the role of Rahab found in Joshua 2 and 6:22–25. Rahab was marginalized by her profession, as head of household, as a foreigner to the Israelites, and for living "on the margins" on the outskirts of the city of Jericho. Moses has died, and Joshua sends spies to gather information as they progress toward this long-anticipated territory. Rahab, recognizing the power of the God of Israel, hides the spies and lies to the king. She uses her intelligence and courage to shield her own family, while God works through her to prepare a way for the Israelites. Rahab gives birth to Boaz, son of Salmon. Each of these stories "call us to look more carefully for God's presence around us and within us."

For Your Information

From the October 14, 2021 meeting:

- The Independent Church Audit has been completed and the auditor's findings state that in all material respects, the financial position of Second Presbyterian Church of Louisville—as of December 31, 2020 and 2019, and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the years then ended—is in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.
- Technology Update: Work on the technology upgrades continues and is progressing nicely. New lighting in the sanctuary will soon be finished. New monitors for hybrid meetings and a new sound system will be installed in Fellowship Hall. New speakers will be installed in the gym. All of the church building upgrades are expected to be complete by mid-November.
- The Reopening Task group continues to meet weekly, as needed, to review CDC guidelines. It is currently recommended that people continue to wear masks when in the church building.
